Why Nonprofits?

The nonprofit sector serves underrepresented populations with a history of lower voter participation. For these community members, nonprofits are a trusted messenger. Nonprofits are empowered by the law to participate in specific civic engagement efforts, including voter registration.

Nonprofit employees CAN:

- Register voters
- Provide information about upcoming elections and ballot measures
- Encourage people to vote
- Help voters understand elections and the voting process
- Allow people to take a voter registration form and submit it themselves
- Take completed voter registration forms and mail them individually or in batches
- Assist in filling out forms

Nonprofit employees CANNOT:

- Encourage people to vote for a particular candidate, or publicize which candidates share the organization's view on contested issues
- Give incentives for people to register or to vote
- Refuse to give anyone a registration form
- Accept registrations you know to be fraudulent
- Provide postage, unless it is specifically requested
