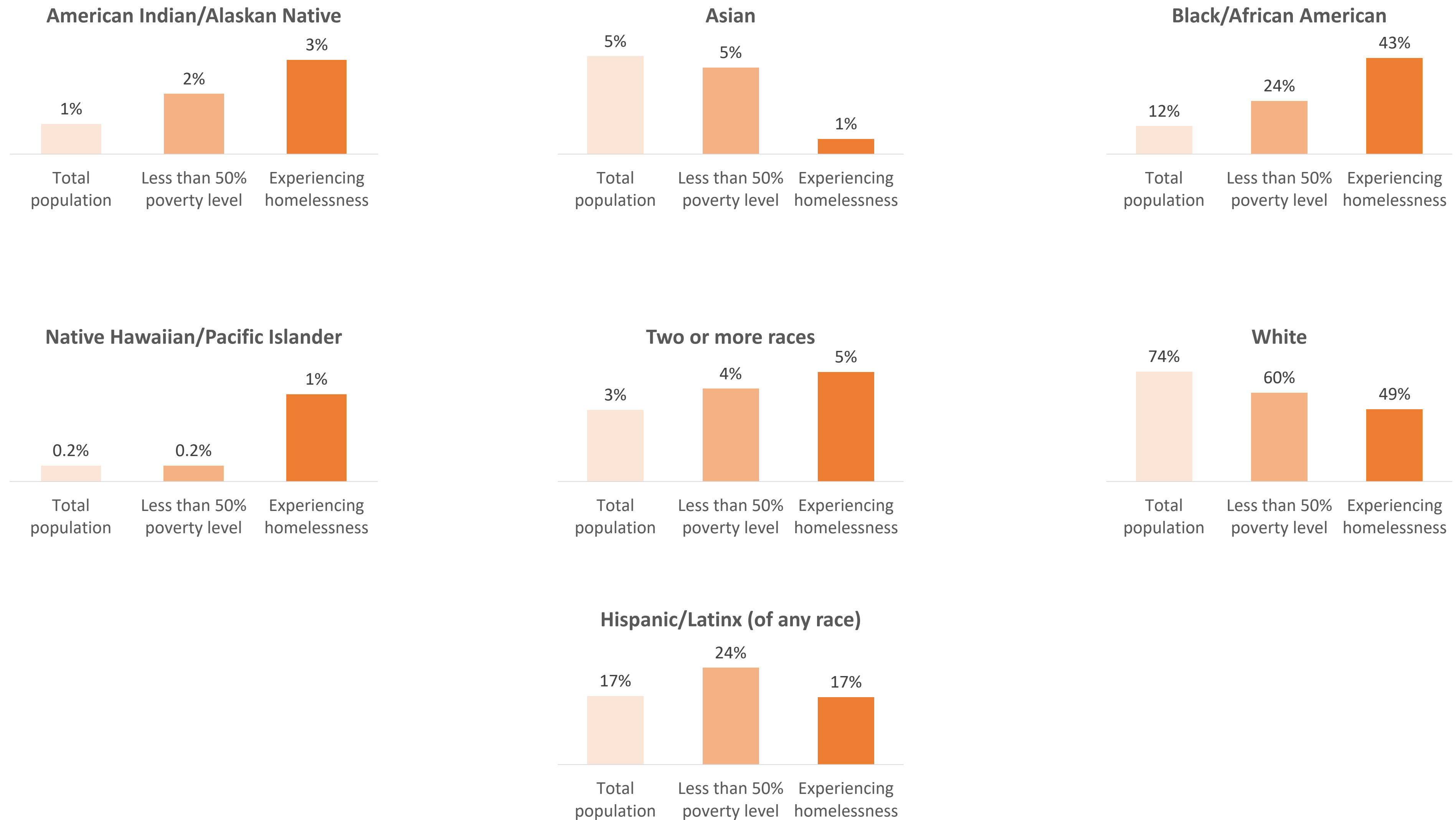

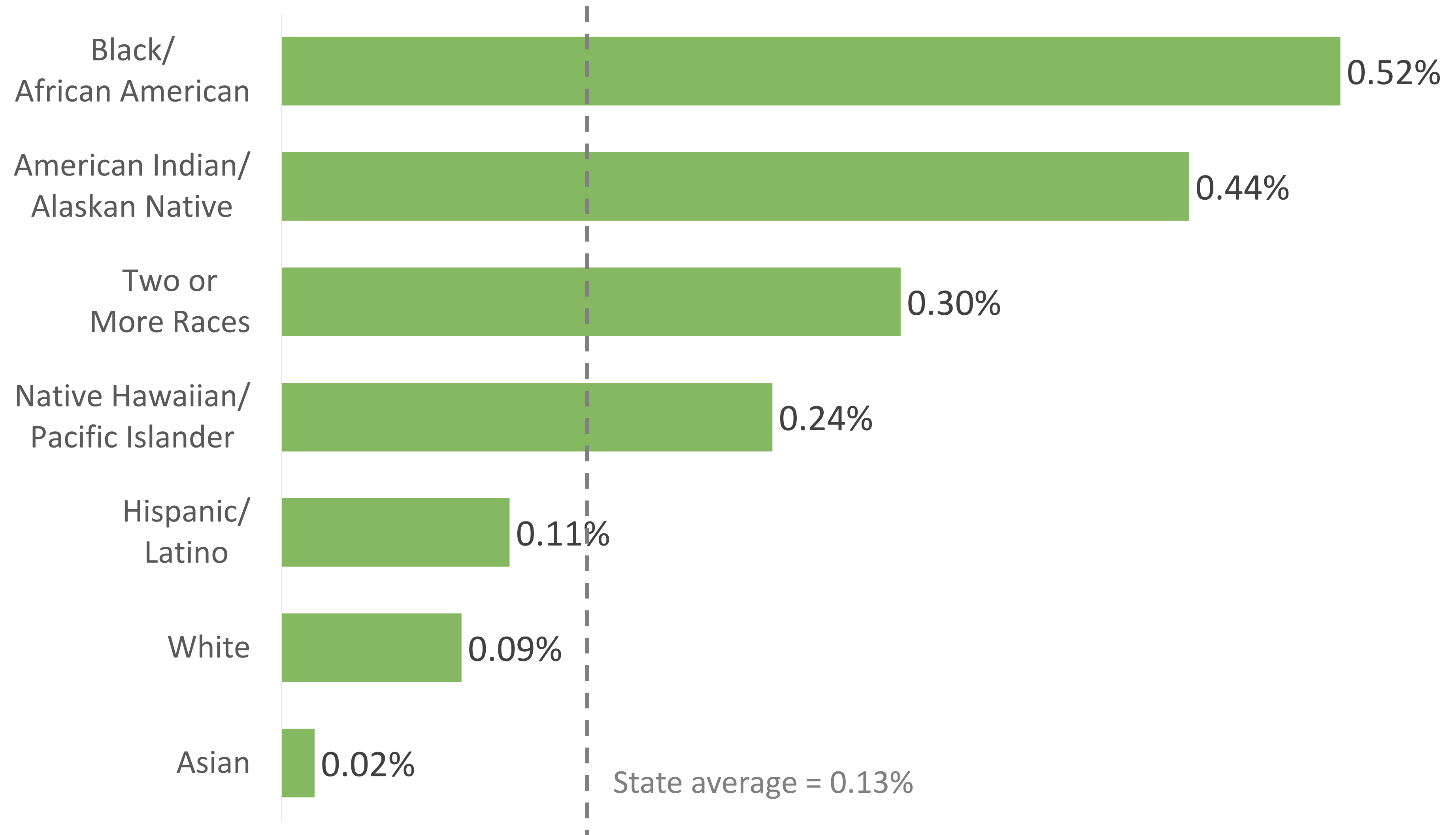
Share of population overall, by poverty, and for individuals experiencing homelessness

(Number in 2017 PIT count divided by total population)*



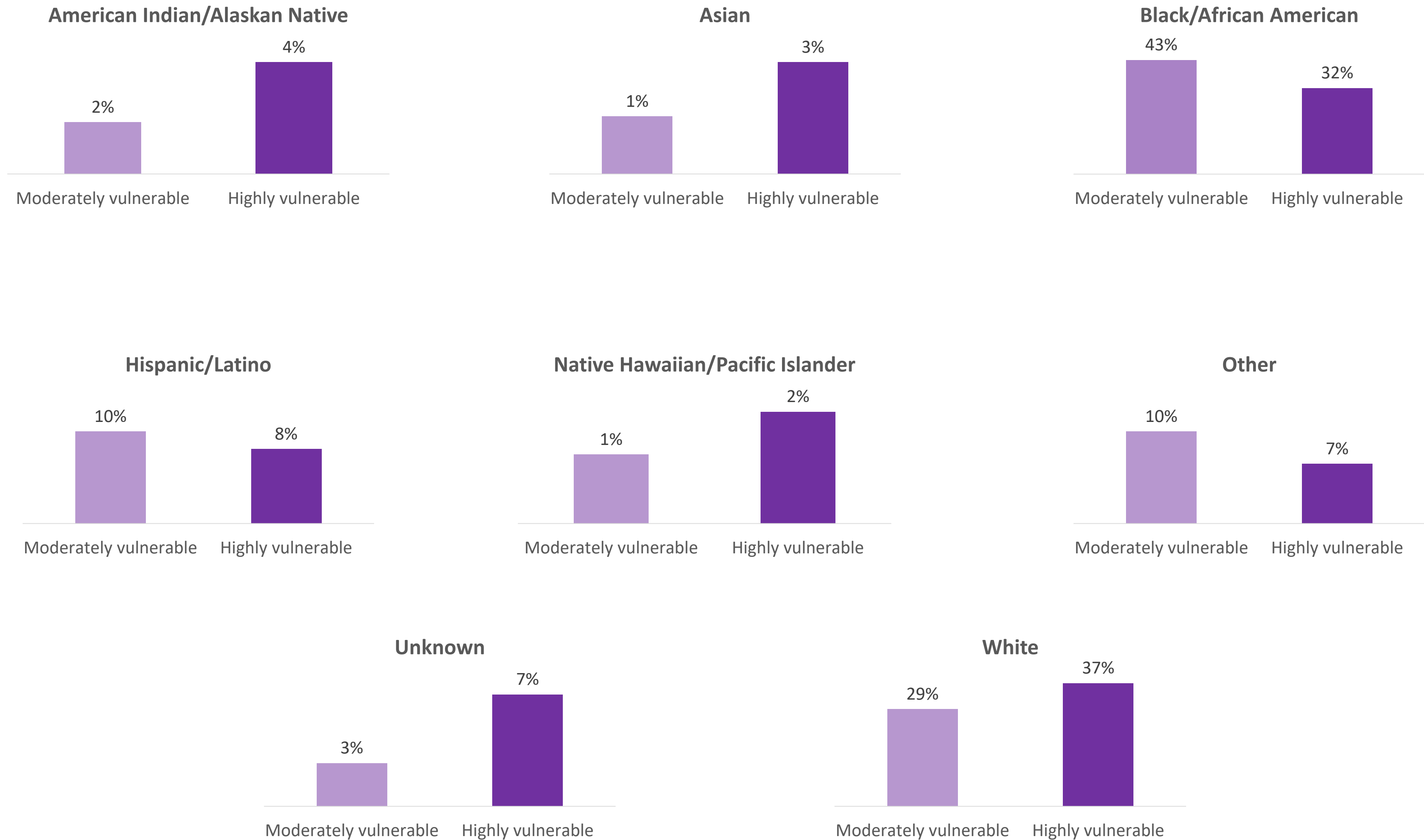

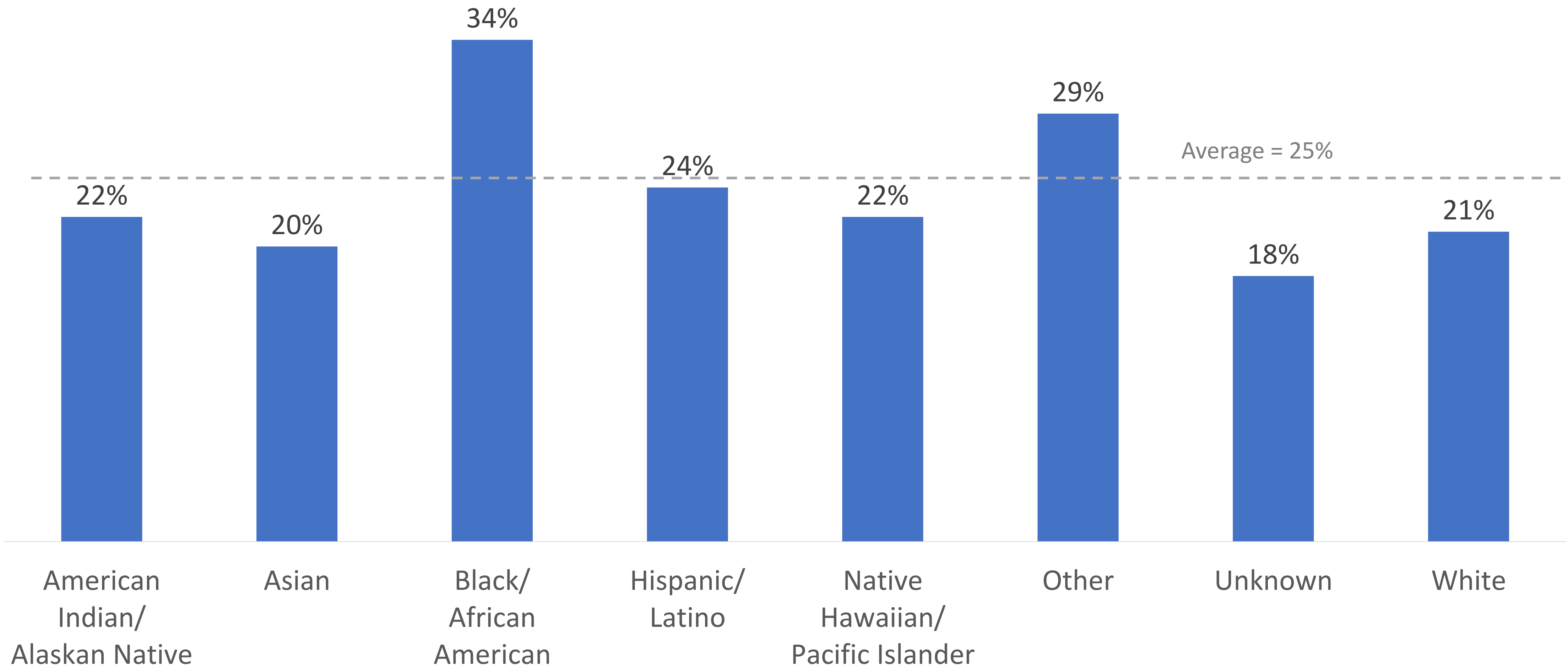
All Home (King County) Coordinated Entry

Share of referrals to housing programs by vulnerability and race/ethnicity



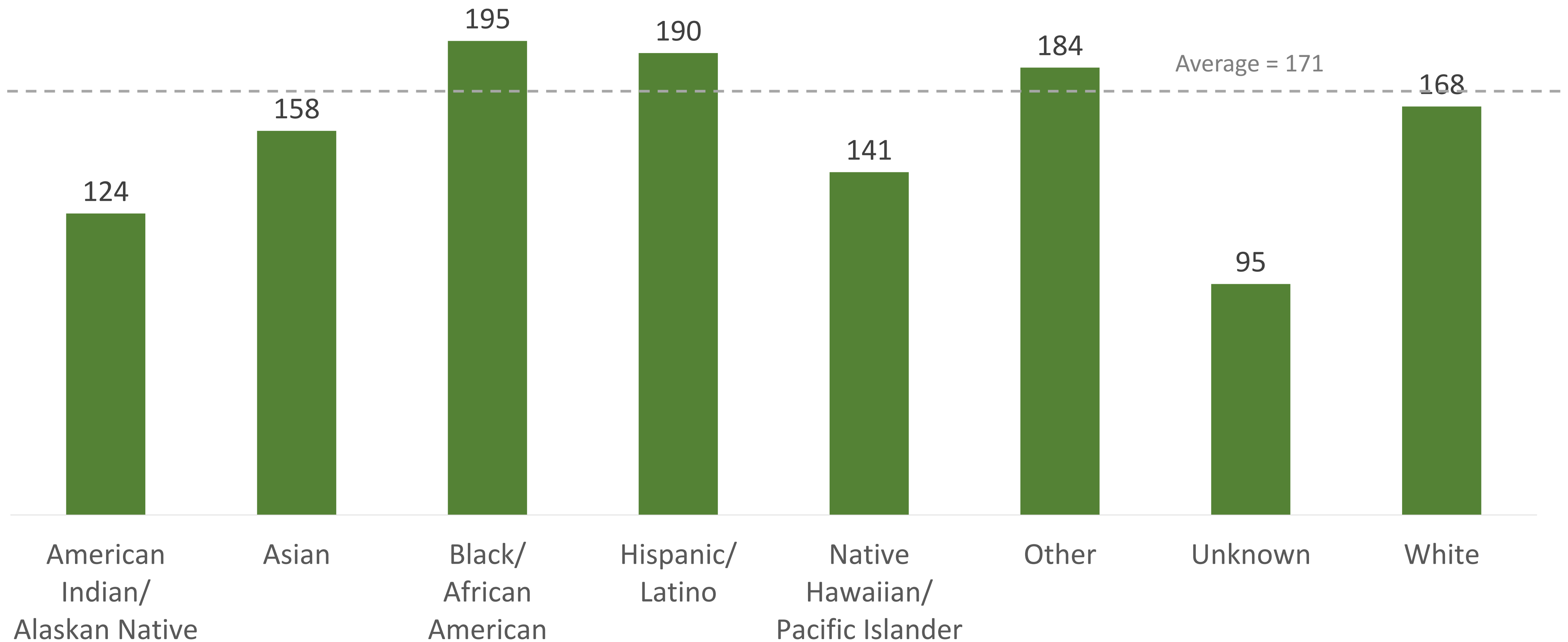
All Home (King County) Exits to Permanent Housing, 2017

Percent of households that exited to permanent housing



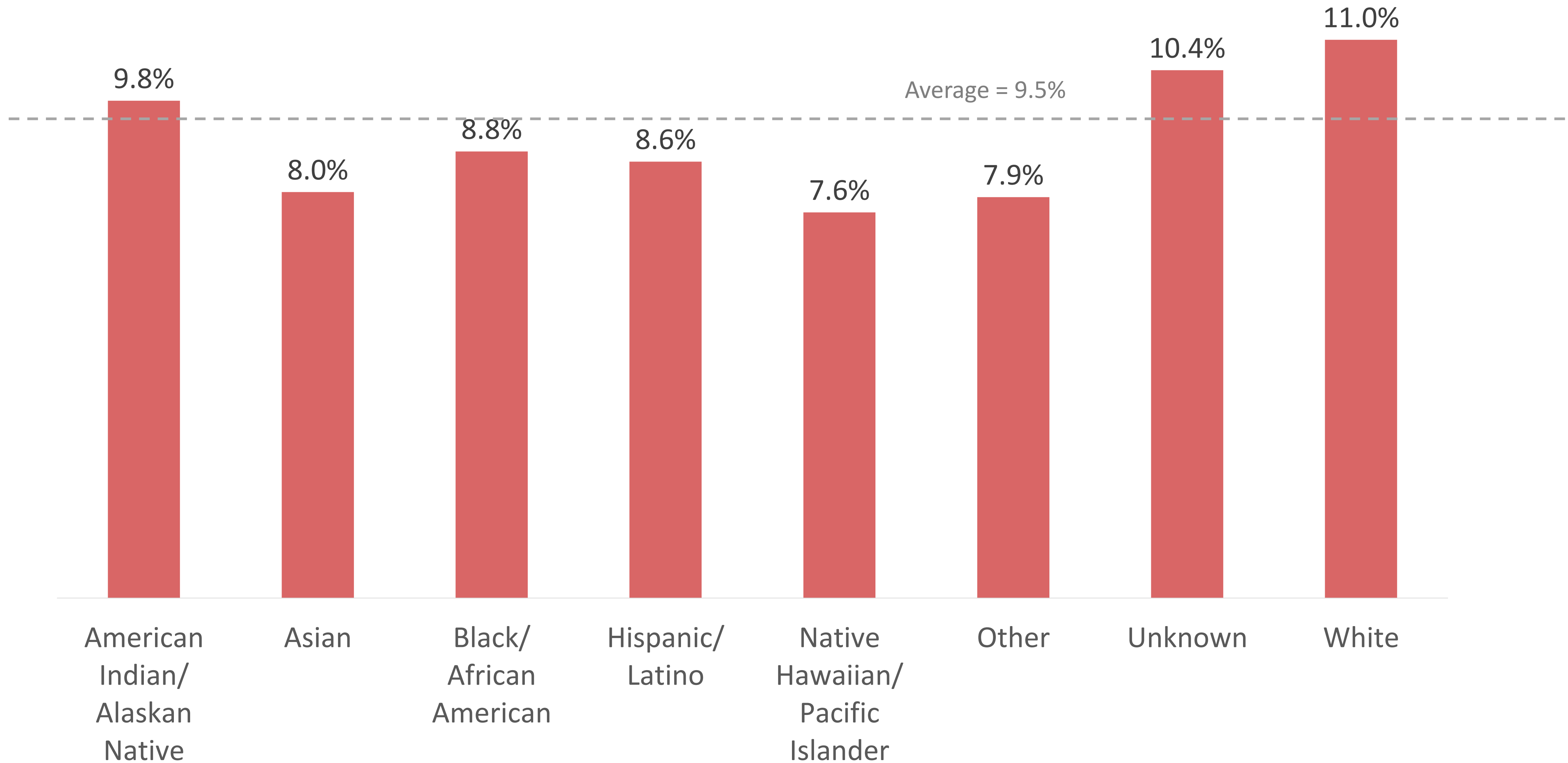
All Home (King County) Length of Time in System, 2017

Average number of days in emergency shelter and transitional housing



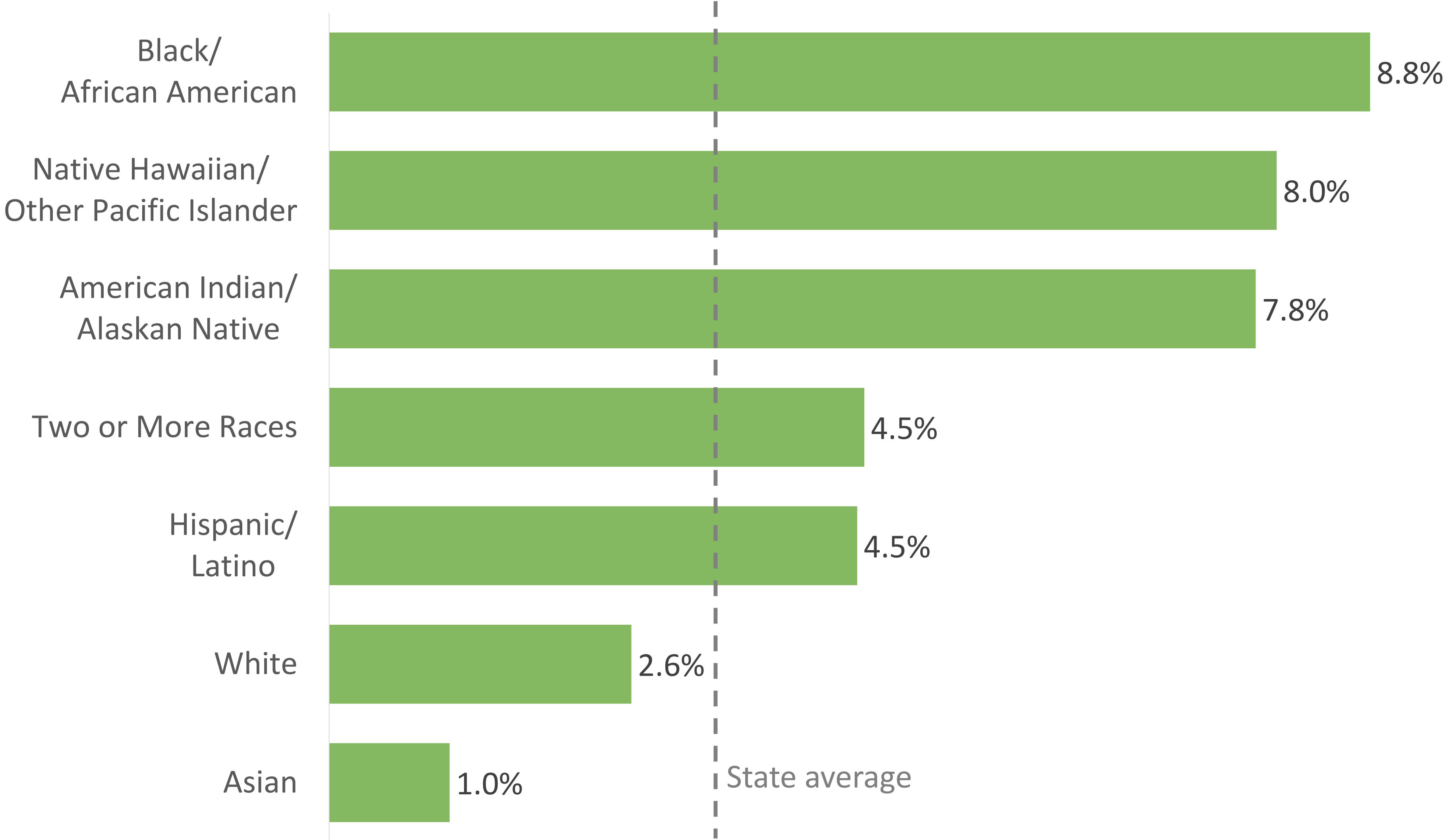
All Home (King County) Returns, 2017

Washington State Rates of Student Homelessness, 2016-17

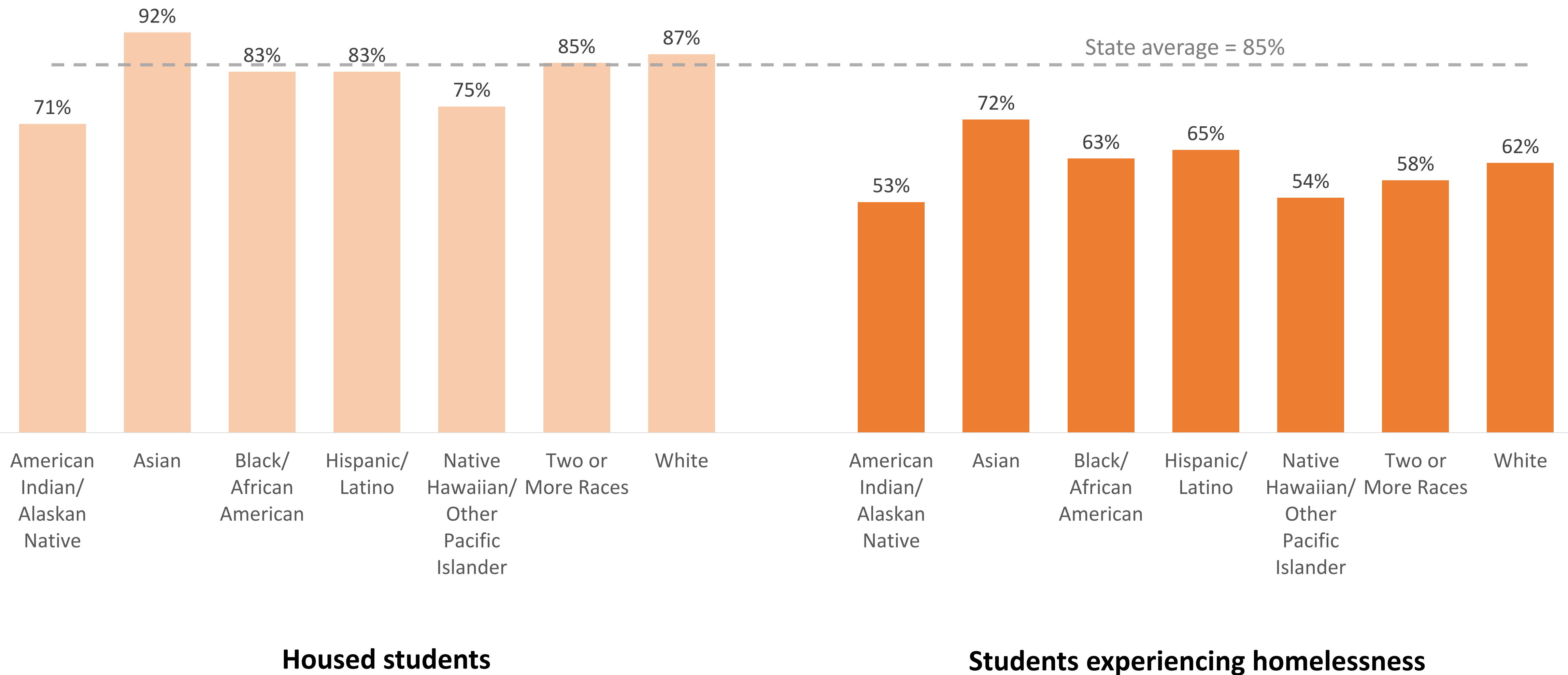
Percent of students identified as experiencing homelessness

Washington State Student Regular Attendance Rates, 2016-17

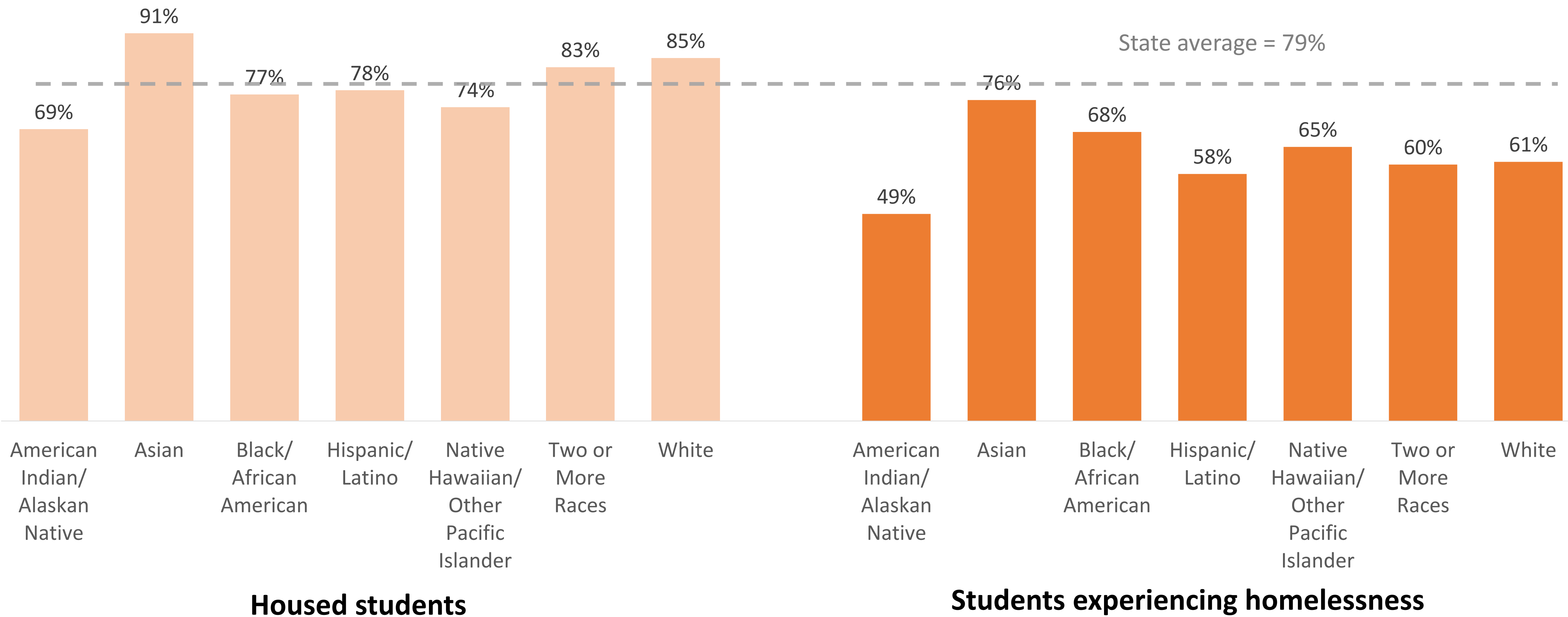
*Percent of students who attend school regularly
